Create a seed for a bold journey from downtown Mount Horeb to the top of Blue Mound.


Does it have wings – fluff – hooks – or all of these?

SEED CONVERSATIONS

Plants want their seeds to be planted. If you could hear them talk, plants might sound like this:

"I'm going to make my seeds have fluff," boasts **Dandelion**. That way kids won't be able to resist! They'll pick up my ball of fluff and wave it around. They'll watch it float on the wind. Do you think they will notice that all the floaty stuff has seeds attached? Just think how far my seeds can go on the wind!"

"Well," says **Apple Tree**, "I think the best way is to grow sweet, eye-catching red fruit that will also carry my seeds inside. People will grow apple trees!

"I think you have it all wrong," says **Burdock**. "I say be bolder! This job is important! My seeds have the most marvelous burs; you should see how they hold on! As soon as some unsuspecting kid or dog passes by, I just attach and go for a ride. And, don't you know, they'll be pulling burs off and dropping my seeds far down the road."

"You know," says **Jewelweed**. "It's important to be planted where you know you can grow. I need to be by water – running water, like creeks and streams. Why take a risk riding the wind? Or a dog? Or have my seeds eaten by some animal and then – *yuck!* But kids can still have fun spreading my seeds along the creek. Listen: I have a pod that explodes!

Yep, kids pinch my tiny green pods – and blam! The outsides curl back and my seeds go sailing, along the water."

Plants don't have conversations like this, but we can see ways plants get their seeds planted – like partnering with people.

When people like what we get from a plant – food or fiber – we collect, share, and grow seeds.

Have you ever pulled a burdock bur from fur or your clothing?

Burs are seed pods that use people and animals to move their seeds.

**Did you ever wonder how the burs stick?

When George de Mestral, a Swiss engineer, found burs in his dog's fur, he saw their tiny hooks, and he invented Velcro!

BE CURIOUS! Go outside and see how seeds move. **Take along** an old sock and a bowl of water. Use these "tools" to figure out which seeds in your neighborhood stick, float, fly or...???

HERE ARE SOME WAYS SEEDS CAN MOVE. SEE IF YOU CAN FIND AN EXAMPLE OF EACH KIND!

Drifters by wind

Floaters by water

Hitchhikers by sticking to clothes, hair or fur

Slingshots by shooting out

Ploppers by gravity – fall to ground

Animal Express by animals who carry and bury

Droppers by animals eating fruit and "planting"

People Express by people who garden!
